FROM OUR FOUNDER & CEO

Dear Friends:

It is with gratitude and joy that I share my reflections on our first year of operations. Amidst the havoc of the early days of the COVID-19 crisis, I experienced a once-in-a-lifetime moment: the search to find help for my two children, who struggled with reading.

Navigating a complex and broken system nearly exhausted our family emotionally and financially. Ultimately, we were able to cobble together appropriate support for our children, although the knowledge of the widespread injustices and institutional failures we learned about throughout the process still haunt me today.

It became clear there was a critical need for **an innovative**, **student-centered**, **family-focused approach to literacy education for all children**, **especially for historically underserved populations** who suffer the most daunting of barriers. The path to such a solution materialized rapidly and led me to found Beyond Kids Reading (BKR).

BKR has come so far, so quickly, because of the expertise and generosity of the powerful community that coalesced around our mission. Our team has hundreds of collective years of experience in education, literacy, and business development, which enabled us to establish a solid organizational foundation and jump into serving children and families immediately.

Only months after beginning our services, we received feedback from one of our families. A child who did not know how to read any words entering 3rd grade, was now able to read whole words. "I am a reader!" the child exclaimed to teachers and to their mom. Equally important is the self-confidence and self-advocacy we see developing in the children we serve.

In our first year of operations, we emerged with a service model comprised of a unique approach emphasizing early diagnostics, customized interventions, whole-family engagement, research-based reading instruction, and a virtual model that eliminates accessibility barriers.

Your support has made all this possible and will continue to be a critical piece of our future achievements. Please enjoy reading about our 2021 successes and celebrating what is still to come!

FROM OUR INTERIM CHAIR OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Dear Friends:

If you grew up in the 70s and 80s, you might recall the public service announcement "Reading is Fundamental." The PSA equated reading as a necessary foundation for all of life's skills. Yet, for those who struggle with reading or have language based learning differences (LBLD), such as dyslexia, reading acquisition can feel isolating and paralyzing.

As a child who struggled with reading, I distinctly remember feeling like the slow kid. I would cry to my mom, "I'm the only one who can't read!" I could not grasp how a group of letters made a word, words made a sentence, and a narrative was communicated. Thankfully, my teachers, family, and doctors recognized special education would give me the tools to learn to read.

Beyond Kids Reading (BKR) was founded for children and families whose experiences run parallel to mine – the one out of five students within the U.S. who identify as dyslexic. When Craig Horning, Founder and CEO of BKR, invited me to join in conceptualizing BKR, I responded instantly, "I'm all in!"

The 'all in' concept undergirds the BKR mission. Reading is a skill that is both complex and beyond kids. It involves an 'all in' constellation of super stars – parents, teachers, school administrators, librarians, specialists, and more – to support, teach, and nurture this skill. Yet, within this constellation of support for families whose children struggle with reading, there is often a lack of appropriate resources, cultural competency, and time, as well as an overwhelming demand to meet each child on their academic journey. That's where BKR comes in.

As chair of the board, I am thrilled that **the BKR model is part of the 'all in' constellation for the LBLD community.** As you read our annual report, I invite you to celebrate with us the successes of each child and family who joined BKR in our pilot year. We have established proof-of-concept to move forward with confidence that BKR is a compass for families, partners, and educators to navigate the LBLD landscape.

BKR is poised to scale and innovate literary access, one student, one family, at a time. I hope you will continue to turn pages with us as we approach new chapters of success.

THE BKR MODEL

In the summer of 2021, our team set out to develop an innovative education model, anchored in a suite of services that could be delivered to children and families in need. We conceptualized and implemented a new approach that challenges and dismantles the silos that too often prevent children, families, educators, schools, private practitioners, and evaluation professionals from forming a cohesive, integrated team. One year later, we have a proof-of-concept that distinguishes BKR from traditional models for serving children with reading struggles, dyslexia, and language based learning differences.

- We invest on the front end in intake and evaluation, allowing us to pinpoint a child's learning profile from the outset so that we can recommend and provide effective intervention strategies out of the gate.
- We offer a comprehensive and integrated suite of services that engages neuropsychologists, reading specialists trained in a variety of methodologies, special educators, and educational advocates – an approach offered only by BKR.
- Our virtual model alleviates or eliminates access barriers posed by geography, timing, and costly travel requirements.
- We offer a menu of services that connects children with supports they need – ensuring a cost- and time-effective solution, eschewing a one-size-fits-all approach.

About: child of a single mother to multiple children, his school district readily chalked his learning challenges up to systemic issues and had not updated his IEP for nearly two years

Strengths: a sweet and kind child, Benjamin is beloved by his teachers and peers and has both an eager and attentive classroom presence

Challenges: a non-reader at the end of elementary school; a rising 6th grader with absolutely no reading foundation at all

BKR Impact: immediately secured extended school year program and assisted Mom in keeping pace with Benjamin's proposed IEP process; recommended and offered support for mediation with the Bureau for Special Education Appeals

Jonathan

2nd grade student at a private day school in New York City

About: child of a family with the social and financial capital seemingly necessary to navigate the system, yet Jonathan's teachers brushed off their concerns.



Strengths: a shining star in the classroom, with standout critical thinking skills, a robust vocabulary, motivation to learn, and above grade level sophistication in oral communication

Challenges: struggling with reading, recognizing letters and words, and, troublingly, was increasingly resistant to even sitting down with a book.

BKR Impact: stepped in immediately and provided the family with clarity around Jonathan's learning style; he showed instant progress with a series of twice weekly one-on-one reading sessions, which also bolstered his sense of self and confidence.

WHOLE CHILD, WHOLE FAMILY, WHOLE COMMUNITY SOLUTIONS

"When Beyond Kids Reading stepped in, both the parent and myself could not have been more grateful or relieved. The team was able to schedule and carry out the neuropsychological evaluation we had all been waiting for in a very short period of time, and they also offered virtual lessons with a reading specialist, created a comprehensive report, and attended an IEP meeting with the school's Special Education team to present their findings and recommendations. All of these were critical steps in advocating for this child's access to a better suited educational environment, but what really struck me in my experience working with Beyond Kids was the compassion and genuine open communication the team had with the parent raising this child, and the educators in his life. Not only has Beyond Kids Reading provided a struggling child with the advocacy and tools necessary to bring about change, but they have also given his parents hope that their son might have a future very different from the one they imagined for him."





CONTRIBUTIONS AT WORK


Youth with specific learning disabilities (SLDs), such as dyslexia, are more readily referred to the juvenile justice system due in part to **few community-level service options available** to youth with these educational needs.

The rate of youth with diagnosed SLDs in juvenile justice custody has been observed at more than seven times that of SLDs in the general population.

Up to 70% of incarcerated youth may have a SLD such as dyslexia.*

Research shows 90% of children with reading difficulties will achieve grade level in reading if they receive help by the first grade.**
